FUN FACTS FOR QUILTERS

- · "Quilt" is derived from the Latin word *culcita*, which means "stuffed sack."
- The earliest depiction of quilting was discovered in **Egypt**; it was an ivory figurine of a pharaoh wearing quilted clothing, ca. 3400 BC.
- Quilted clothing was popular in Europe, especially under chain-mail armor for soldiers. It kept the metal from rusting and kept the knights comfy under all their heavy gear.



- European settlers brought quilting to the Americas, and the earliest-known quilt made in America is from 1704.
- During the expansion into the Western United States, quilts were used as window coverings, doors, and walls for temporary housing as well as currency for pioneers.



"Quilting bees" originated in the midwest United States during the 1800s, where a lack of neighbors and a need for socializing drew women together to finish quilts and make new friends.

- Even though the sewing machine was invented in 1790, hand-quilting was still more popular for the next 100 years.
- · Quilting became popular again in the 1960s, when the counterculture movement encouraged people to get back to their early, industrial roots.
- The average quilter is 63 years old.
- Beginner quilters spend an average of 6.9 hours a week on their craft. Advanced quilters spend around 17.6 hours.



Comfort Quilts—February

It was a quiet month for Comfort Quilts. Lots of deliveries had been made in December. It was so darn cold who wanted to go anywhere. And some January cleaning and reorganizing needed to be done. But at the January meeting I was asked if I have a favorite quilt pattern. What a coincidence. I had just finished two different ones. One in pastels, one in brights. Both toddler size. Both pineapple quilts.

Before moving here I attended a workshop at a local quilt shop done by a local quilter, Gyleen Fitzgerald, who was demonstrating her new ruler for making pineapple quilts. She was finishing up a book and I guess we were a group of willing workers for her to practice teaching the technique. Everything about making quilts this way I loved. I have probably made over 20 by now. It starts off with a 2-1/2 square and then lots of 1-1/2 inch strips. You trim each round as you go. I don't really care if everything lines up perfectly since mine are always so scrappy, who would even know.

I've made modifications to the block. I've used bigger centers, gone out to 12 inches, stayed a little more controlled with color choices. But my favorite is still just filling a bag with strips and just pulling out the next one and sewing it on. Twenty blocks gives me a good size toddler quilt.

There are lots of other ideas for quilts like this on the internet. Crumb quilts, log cabins, improvisational piecing. Our October workshop is on scrappy piecing. All of this I like. But if you had to pin me down and make me pick only one quilt to make forever, give me my ruler and a bag of strips. Pineapples it is for me.
